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# Schools are reflections of their communities.

### School Relationship with Police and Fire Departments

There are historically strong, sustained relationships, services and communication among school officials, local police and fire departments

Each school maintains a daily, full-time presence of a School Resource Officer

Police and fire officials assist on-site in providing feedback by regularly reviewing safety drills (fire, tornado, mock lock-down procedures)

Regular two-way communication exists regarding activities on the school campus and in the community

### Illinois Youth Survey

An anonymous self-report survey administered voluntarily in school settings and designed to gather information about a variety of health and social indicators including substance use patterns and attitudes of Illinois youth

Managed and administered by the Center for Prevention and Development, School of Social Work, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign

Funded bi-annually by the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) since 1993

Administered in the spring to students in 10th and 12th grades. Available for use with 8th grade students

### Illinois Youth Survey

#### Types of Survey Questions

Alcohol, tobacco and other drug use

Beliefs about drug use

Health and nutritional behavior

Feelings about school

Family support and rules about alcohol use

### Illinois Youth Survey

#### Validity

For surveys of this type, check of substance use responses against actual drug tests have demonstrated validity


Pattern of use revealed by IYS are consistent with measures such as differential treatment rates for different substances


School sample may not include students who are chronically absent or who have dropped out


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
Possibility that respondents may not be truthful in answers. Survey data is screened for inconsistencies





#### **Deterrents: Promoting a Safe Learning Environment**

#### **General:**

Two-Part Approach: Counseling and Consequences

- Build trusting relationships & intervene at the lowest level in order to instill healthy decision-making
- Proactive and Early Intervention
- Create a risk-free environment for sharing information
- Student Rights and Responsibilities/Code of Conduct (athletics/activities)

#### Supervision by School Staff

- Parking lots
- Entrances to the school
- Hallways
- Classrooms
- School events

#### Police Presence

- School Resource Officer whenever school is in session.
- At larger school events or as requested

#### Passive Surveillance of Buildings and Grounds

- 103 HD cameras at GBS
- 96 HD cameras at GBN

#### **Board Policy 8460: ILLEGAL SUBSTANCES AND PARAPHERNALIA**

First violation for the use, possession, receipt, or distribution of an illegal substance

- Suspension for up to 10 school days
- Submission to a full substance abuse assessment
- Compliance with all requirements arising from the assessment, including random drug testing. Failure to comply may result in expulsion
- Loss of open lunch (if eligible) for 9 weeks
- Loss of driving privileges (if eligible) for 9 weeks
- Restricted study hall in lieu of unscheduled time for 9 weeks
- Loss of participation in extracurricular activities according to the prescribed action in the Glenbrook Code of Conduct
- Loss of attendance at school sponsored events, ceremonies (including graduation) and activities that are in addition to the student's participation in extracurricular activities for 9 weeks.
- In situations of *egregious conduct*, the matter will be referred by the Superintendent for consideration of expulsion

#### Second Violation for use, possession, receipt or distribution of an illegal substance

- Suspension for up to 10 days
- Referral by the MDRC to the Board of Education for consideration of expulsion Third and any subsequent violation for use, possession, or distribution of an illegal substance
  - Referral by the MDRC to the Board of Education for consideration of expulsion

All violations of Board Policy 8460 are reported to the local police department

#### <u>Definition of Terms: Egregious Conduct</u>

Egregious conduct includes, but is not limited to, any of the following:

- Distribution, use, receipt or possession of an illegal substance coupled with the threat of infliction of physical harm;
- Sale or purchase of an illegal substance;
- Distribution, receipt, use or possession of an illegal substance coupled with conduct which endangers or has the potential to endanger the health and safety of others with or without the consent of the recipient;
- Violation of this policy along with that of another board policy.
- In situations of egregious conduct, the matter will be referred directly to the Board of Education for consideration of sanctions, including expulsion.

#### **Board Policy 8500: SEARCH and SEIZURE**

• School officials have the authority to search students, personal belongings, automobile, and lockers if there is reasonable suspicion that the student has violated a school rule or the law in accordance with Illinois School Code 105: 5/10-22.6
