Re: Discipline Report to Board of Education

The purpose of this report is to provide statistics on disciplinary incidents at the two high schools as documented in the student information system. Reviewing trends in the data, both positive and negative, may provide further insight to the effectiveness of board policies and school procedures that may be considered for revision. An objective review of the data may also provide insight to overall climate and conditions at the school that can impact the learning environment and the feeling of safety experienced by students and staff.

Background

In the past, documentation of discipline incidents by the deans and deans' office staff were dependent on hand-written records prior to the adoption of student information systems to replace Outcast. Outcast was a district-developed system that did not contain a discipline component. In the early 2000s, the district transitioned from Outcast to SASI and it was not until the third year of SASI implementation that discipline incidents started to be maintained electronically. GBS initiated the first digital records in the late 2000s, and GBN adopted the process a year later. The problem that existed with the first electronic records system is that the two schools differed in the disciplinary incident codes used by the deans and the deans' office staff.

As the district transitioned from SASI to SchoolLogic in the summer of 2009, significant efforts were made to standardize the incident codes, but some variation eventually evolved. The district transitioned again from SchoolLogic to PowerSchool three years ago, and at that time, the deans were able to standardize incident codes for both schools. However, it should be recognized that although the schools have standardized incident codes, the use of codes during the recording of incidents remains dependent on the judgement of the person establishing the incident record, which introduces a degree of variance in the data. Overall, the data should be regarded as a consistent approximation of the frequency of incidents at each school and discussions of the incidents should be mindful that there will be some inconsistency among the seven (7) deans recording incident data at the two schools.

Data from the last two complete school years were extracted from PowerSchool in an effort to show the most recent trends; historical categorical trends were formulated by each school

based on data that was collected through other analog and digital methods since 2005. We have included the incidents by category for each school. Glenbrook Evening High School is color coded in tan, Glenbrook North in green, and Glenbrook South in blue.

Data Trends based on Incident Data (PowerSchool)

- The total number of incidents per student at each school is down significantly over the last two years.
- The number of category I incidents at each school remains very low and does not seem to be escalating since the 2005-2006 school year.
- The top six infractions at both schools have shifted away from unexcused absences in the last two years.

Rationale/Trends/Highlights

Glenbrook North and Glenbrook South are very safe schools. The main reason for this is that our students are observant to others' behaviors and do a very good job of self-monitoring. We ask students to let us know when issues arise that may put themselves or others in a harmful situation.

- We are fortunate that we don't often deal with high level infractions such as physical altercations and weapons. Therefore, we have the ability to be proactive with students by being visible in common areas, talking with and getting to know students outside of the classroom, and building positive relationships with those students who need a little extra support from adults in our buildings.
- Each school's administrative team presents to the student body at the start of the school year the expectations and a review of major rules in the handbook. We feel that because we have this opportunity to reach so many students, it helps set a positive tone for the beginning of the year. This is also a way for us to provide new information pertaining to new rules and policies; in addition, we can answer student questions concerning the handbook.
- Professional development opportunities allow our staff to stay current on safety and security for our schools. Our staff are certified in CPR/AED procedures on a regular basis. Each school year, we oversee regularly scheduled safety/emergency drills with the help of local first responders. Other topics discussed have been de-escalation of conflict with emotionally charged individuals, trends in adolescent drug use, and positive communication with young adults.
- Problem solving teams consisting of Deans and Student Services staff meet weekly to discuss students who might be having attendance or behavior issues as well as monitoring students who are having difficulty with social/emotional issues. With the services and procedures that we have put in place, we are working with the same amount of students, but in a form different than in the past. We still issue

consequences when deemed appropriate, but we are finding that students come to us to talk through issues before they get themselves into trouble.

As you can see from the start of the data collection, attendance and attendance-related issues have been the top infractions. We started to see a different trend starting in 2012-2013. The reason for the change is that we went to a student system that worked with our automated caller so that parents were notified when a student was absent, late, or tardy to a class. With this call/email that went home, we allowed parents to respond in a more efficient manner, which has allowed us to clear more of the situations than in the past. Other consistent violations are inappropriate behavior/insubordination, cell phone violations, and parking violations. With this being said, you can see that the number of these infractions continues to go down. We believe that the reason for this is that we are able to be more proactive than reactive in working with students.

Identified Work for 2016-2017 (Senate Bill 100)

Senate Bill 100 was approved by the Illinois House and signed by Governor Rauner in the fall of 2015. Now known as Public Act 99-0456, this new law takes effect on September 15, 2016. This Act requires the school board to provide written expulsion and suspension decisions that include specific reasons as to why removing the student from the school is in the best interest of the school and a rationale as to the duration of the removal. Further, it prohibits "zero tolerance" policies and limits the number of days allowable for out-of-school suspensions. Should a student be suspended out-of-school for four days or more, they must be provided appropriate and available support services to be able to make up work for the equivalent academic credit.

In consulting with legal counsel, they have advised us against initiating any type of revision to existing discipline policies until after PRESS (policy services we utilize from IASB) has issued revisions that are in keeping with the new state code. The Scariano firm will then review the proposed PRESS policy revisions and work with us to bring our policies into compliance prior to the 2016-2017 school year. Since the number of student out-of-school suspensions at each school is low and there are already existing alternatives provided for handling discipline incidents, we believe we will be able to incorporate the new legislation successfully.
