Re: Entrepreneurship: Business Incubator Program Expectations and Release from Liability Agreements

Recommendation

Students and parents/guardians of students enrolled in the new course Entrepreneurship: Business Incubator will be required to acknowledge both the *Program Expectations* and *Consent and Release from Liability* by signing respective agreements. The purpose of these documents is to outline the expectations for the course and release the District from liability resulting from product and/or small business development. Participation in this program is conditioned upon the student's and his/her parent's or guardian's acceptance of both agreements.

Background

At the January 25, 2016 board meeting, the Board of Education approved the new course Entrepreneurship: Business Incubator. This year-long course blends entrepreneurship lessons with an immersion in application of business practices to bring an idea to reality. Students learn by doing through authentic, real-world application and hands-on problem solving by developing a business idea as part of a team. From concept to minimum viable product, to pitch, students are hypothesizing, testing, adapting, and learning as they work in teams. At the conclusion of the course, teams will pitch their products to a panel of business advisors and venture capitalists for the opportunity to be funded and move forward in development.

Required Agreements

IncubatorEDU provides districts with a template for program expectations that may be adapted to better address the unique expectations of a particular district. Additionally, to resolve Board concerns regarding District liability, the *Consent and Release from Liability* form was created by an attorney hired by the District.

Entrepreneurship: Business Incubator Program Expectations

This form outlines expectations of students as they develop and launch their product and/or business venture. Students will launch a test version of their business, known as a Minimum Viable Product. Each team may receive a nominal grant to finance the business. By signing the form, students and parents acknowledge there will be no expectation of commercial confidentiality in the ideas and concepts disclosed by a teacher or student in connection with the course and that any grant award will be repaid should the business generate a profit.

Student and Parent Consent and Release from Liability

By signing this form, students and parents acknowledge the District shall be held harmless from any injury, liability and/or financial loss resulting from the development of the student's idea, product, concept and/or future business venture.

- b. At all times, the student will be 100% responsible for his/her own actions in owning and marketing their own businesshis/her product or service;
- c. Any business-product or service created by the student will, in no way, be owned, operated, insured or indemnified by District 225, and District 225 will not provide, co-sign or incur any financial obligations (e.g., loans and other forms of indebtedness) on behalf of the student's business product or service; and
- d. The student and his/her parent or guardian together release and hold harmless District 225, as well as its Board of Education members, agents, employees, contractors, insurers and sureties of any and all responsibility and liability, claims, rights and causes of action (including all costs, expenses and reasonable attorney's fees incurred by District 225; (a) for any injury to or caused by the student resulting from or otherwise related to the student's creation and operation of his/her own businessproduct or service; (b) arising from, or pertaining to the student's development of any information, business product or concept; (c) arising from, or pertaining to, violation of any intellectual property rights in connection with student's development or use of any business product or concept, or (d) arising from or pertaining to, the business conduct or unpermitted use of any information, product or concept in which the student claims an interest by any potential investor, business venturer, volunteer or mentor who is a participant in the District's Incubator program.
- e. The undersigned further agree that District 225 is neither a party to, is responsible for, nor has any interest in any business venture entered into as a result of the student's participation in this program.

Entrepreneurship: Business Incubator Program Expectations

Background

Glenbrook H.S. District 225 (District 225) has teamed teaming with business professionals and educators to offer one of the most innovative and exciting high school courseprogram in entrepreneurship, s in the nation. Collectively, these supporters represent some of the best of the American business world. The participating participating entrepreneurs business professionals from the Glenview-Northbrook community alone have launched over a dozenmultiple businesses that, among other things, have created thousands scores of jobs.

In this courseprogram, students will develop and launch a small entrepreneurial enterprise while exploring the economic and business literature about establishing a startup company. Many class sessions are will be taught by experts, such as startup and the human resource specialists, and other business experts in conjunction with a certified teacher. Students are will also supported by mentors and experienced volunteer businesspeople, who will can share their own practical experience.

Minimum Viable Product

At the beginning of the second semester, students will launch a test version of their business, known as a Minimum Viable Product. With the generous support of the Glenbrook High School Foundation, Eeach team of students may receive a nominal grant to finance the launch based on generous support from the Glenbrook High School Foundation. Just as with any business, students are will be expected to account for these funds and maintain proper records (producinproducing receipts, etc.). Students are will be expected obligated to repay the grant if the enterprise generates a profit. If they it loses money, there is will be no expectation of repayment.

End of Course Presentations

Students will have two opportunities to share their final business plans. The first will be a required, graded presentation to the teacher and a board of volunteers from the local business community. The second will be by invitation and voluntary. This presentation will be shared with various groups of potential investors, who may will be able to choose to financially support the business and create an enterprise that will be run by the students.

The investors may will be able to fund more than one business or may choose not to fund any. A second year of advanced study will be a part of the academic program for funded students who will be launching their businesses.

Grading for the course and potential investments are will be mutually exclusive wholly separate, meaning students can will be able to earn a good grade even if they have are not been chosen for funding.

Commercial Confidentiality

This is will be and always must be an educational process conducted in an open classroom. Students and teachers will engage freely in the exchange and testing of ideas, concepts and processes. During this time, there will be original ideas developed and presented and there will be refinement of those ideas.
